Scholarship Funds Available in 2012

The California Scottish Rite Foundation will award scholarships in the following categories:

UNDERGRADUATE SCHOLARSHIP

Award is \$2000 per year, until graduation, or for a maximum of 4 years; you must be a California resident, aged 17-25, seeking a college degree as an undergraduate at any fully accredited college or university nationwide with a major study plan in a standard academic field.

RALPH HALE RUPPERT SCHOLARSHIP

Award is \$2000 per year, until graduation, or for a maximum of 4 years; you must be a California resident, aged 17-25, seeking a college degree as an undergraduate at any fully accredited college or university nationwide with a study plan in medicine, engineering, forestry or public school administration.

BALDWIN SCHOLARSHIP (GRADUATE AID)

Award is a total of \$6000 for 1 year; you must be a California resident pursuing a masters or doctorate degree at any California campus offering the required course of study in the fields of foreign service, public school administration or speech language pathology.
